Annual Elections 2023

The RMIT University Student Union Incorporated (RUSU) provides all RMIT students with events, representation and support. RUSU is the only 100% independent body at RMIT and is governed by 28 elected student representatives that comprise the Student Union Council – RUSU is run FOR students BY students. We are here to ensure every student's university experience extends beyond lectures and assignments. Every week RUSU's purple colours are out and about with free food and fun. RUSU has around 80 clubs and societies that students can join – clubs may be political, spiritual, academic, cultural and social. While RUSU is the heart of student life, RUSU is also here for students when they need help - we have an extensive student advocacy service, information counters, offer a welfare drop-in centre and keep safe spaces on campuses.

About the Elections

Voting at these elections will be conducted via an online method. All enrolled students will receive a link to vote in their student email on Monday 4 September. Students can vote on their own devices at any time during election week, OR attend a polling location in person to vote.

Voting will be by the optional preferential and optional proportional representation methods. Optional proportional representation will be the method of counting for those positions where more than one candidate is to be elected.

Polling will be conducted from 9am, Monday 4 September 2023 until 1pm, Friday 8 September 2023. The returning Officer is Jessica Fox.

Referendum



RUSU is running a referendum to propose a change to the RUSU Constitution at the same time as the RUSU Annual election. The proposed change to the constitution is to increase the number of elected RUSU Indigenous Officers from one to two.

The referendum will be held at the same time as the 2023 Student Union elections - from **4 to 8 September.**

All currently enrolled RMIT students will receive an email to their student account on 4 September. The email will include with a link to vote in the RUSU Annual elections, AND to vote in the referendum to change the RUSU Constitution.

Help RUSU increase Indigenous student representation within RUSU and RMIT. VOTE YES! to change the RUSU Constitution.

The referendum question is as follows:

REFERENDUM - RUSU Elected Indigenous Officers

The RUSU Student Union Council is proposing to amend section 4.1.9 of the RUSU Constitution to increase the number of elected RUSU Indigenous Officers from one to two. The purpose of this change is to increase representation of Indigenous student voices at RUSU and RMIT.

The proposed new clause is:

4.1.9 the Indigenous Officer.

The position of Indigenous Officer may be held by up to two eligible students running on a joint ticket, each who identify as Indigenous (as determined by the Student Union election Regulations). If two students hold this position, then together they may cast only one vote at SUC meetings in accordance with the Student Union Regulations

Eligible voters will receive an email from the RUSU Returning Officer with the subject line 'RMIT University Student Union (RUSU) 2023 Annual Elections & Referendum – Voting Link' on Monday 4 September 2023. An individual voting link will be provided in this email. Open this link to access a page with all of the positions being contested.

Voting for a team: If you wish to vote for all candidates from a team you can do so by selecting the team of your preference at the top of the page. Simply click the box next to the team of your preference.
